Who was DAVID BERMAN?

David Berman was a great friend and colleague to many mental health and alcohol and drug professionals.

Originally from the United States, he worked for 7 years at the Strathcona Mental Health Team as a community mental health worker. In 1989, he initiated the Dual Diagnosis Program and became its first director.

Sadly, on April 4, 1991 - one day before his 44th birthday - Dave passed away.

As a tribute to Dave, the David Berman Memorial Fund was established following his death. The aim was to host an educational event each year which would honour him by bringing together professionals sharing his commitment to bridging mental health and alcohol and drug systems. This annual conference is a tribute to his memory.

9:00 am Treating Early Life Developmental Trauma:
A Science Based Perspective

Dr. Cardwell C. Nuckols

President, Cardwell C. Nuckols & Associates, LLC, Longwood, FL

Take a look at the population you treat. No matter whether it is a criminal justice, alcohol and drug or psychiatric population, the recidivists are going to have a high incidence of early life trauma. Research is teaching us more and more about this population. However, research is only helpful when it can be translated into clinically useful technique.

This skills training event will focus on the treatment of early life trauma survivors whose lives are complicated by addiction and other disorders. Participants can expect to hear what the research tells us about this population and how this evidence can be used to help. Practical treatment techniques translated from the research will give participants hands-on skills that can be used to better client outcomes.

Objectives:

1. Describe the neurophysiologic basis of shame and review its treatment.
2. Discuss the role of the right hemisphere orbitofrontal cortex in affect regulation.
3. Describe the developmental difficulties encountered by the prefrontal cortices secondary to early life trauma and how these difficulties can be treated.
4. Describe therapeutic "rupture" from a brain perspective and how a clinician can successfully navigate a client through this difficulty.
5. Discuss vertical and horizontal integration of the brain and the process of client transcendence.
6. Describe the treatment goal of "learning to live gracefully in the moment"

A1 Old Wounds: Early Trauma & the Development of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder

Dr. Diane McIntosh

The impact of childhood adverse events, including physical and sexual abuse, is to create a vulnerability to later life psychopathology, including anxiety and mood disorders. This talk will explore the neurobiology and neuroanatomical changes associated with psychological trauma, and particularly related to childhood adverse events. I will review the best-practice evidence regarding the appropriate management of individuals with acute and chronic symptoms associated with exposure to a traumatic event. I will also discuss the importance of treating depressed and anxious women in the peri- and post-partum period due to the risks to both mother and child.

A2 Community Reinforcement and Family Training

CRAFT, or Community Reinforcement and Family Training, was developed from CRA as an intervention approach. CRAFT works with family members to develop strategies that help them engage a treatment refusing loved one into substance misuse treatment. Multiple research and clinical trials have shown CRAFT to be successful in engaging almost 7 out of 10 clients into treatment.

A3 Working with Borderline Personality Disorder Behaviour and Clients with Concurrent Disorders

Based on the work of Marsha Linehan, we will examine a biosocial model of personality disorder, discuss some of the problems helpers face when working with this population, discuss how Dialectical Behaviour Therapy techniques can be used to help individuals and consider community case management strategies for managing difficult behaviours. Special attention will be paid to addressing the needs of clients who have multiple problems including substance use and serious and persistent mental illness.

A4 Adult Clients with Concurrent Disorders, Where Do We Begin?: Top Ten Tips from Best Practice Principles

- Detailed explanation of neurotransmission, brain function, and brain development and how these are affected by mental health disorders and substance use
- Key elements in the development of mental health disorders with a specific emphasis on substance use
- Specific mental health disorders and their medical treatment in relation to substance use, side effects, and brain effect
- Medications used to treat withdrawal from substance use and their safety in clients on psychotropic medications for concurrent disorders

B1 Risk and Readiness: Extending Services and Supports For People Affected By Concurrent Disorders

The long tradition in addressing addiction and mental health problems has been based on a logic of readiness, where a motivated person undertakes intentional change. Increasingly we have come to realize such change tends not to endure, and that, as busy as we are kept this way, it means that the most vulnerable are not well served. What happens if we extend our approach to these problems to include a logic of risk? What does it mean with people, regardless of their substance use and mental health goals? This session will open a dialogue on these themes, based on what evidence and experience are showing us.

B2 PTSD and Addiction: Assessment & Treatment Issues

C2 Innovative Addiction Research in Vancouver: Supervised Injection, Heroin Prescription and More

Attendees will become familiar with the rationale for, methodological design of, and key findings related to the evaluation of the supervised injection facility in Vancouver. In addition, the findings of international clinical trials in the area of heroin prescription will be reviewed and the design and early experiences with the Canadian heroin prescription trial will be presented. Learners will appreciate the key differences between supervised injection and heroin prescription as well as the elements of the Vancouver environment which facilitate such innovative research. Finally, some other innovative research projects will be briefly examined, such as: provision of intravenous antibiotics to injection drug users in a community-based setting, and centralized access for a multi-level system of withdrawal management care.

C3 Concurrent Anger and Addictions: Issues and Implications for Clinical Practice

Though anger, aggression, and addictions issues frequently co-occur, little attention has been paid to the integrated treatment of these concurrent problems. This session will explore issues in the prevalence, assessment, and understanding of concurrent anger and addictions. Promising research findings will be presented on the integrated treatment of concurrent anger and addictions problems.

C4 Screening for Concurrent Disorders: Rationale, Approaches and Challenges being Addressed

Best practice guidelines developed here in Canada and elsewhere for assisting people with concurrent disorders have recommended the universal screening for mental health problems among people seeking help for addiction treatment and vice versa for those seeking mental health treatment and support. This presentation will provide an overview of the rationale underlying these recommendations and highlight the state-of-the-art tools available today for the busy practitioner. The presentation will conclude with a discussion of challenges being faced in this area and the research and program development currently underway to further develop evidence-informed advice in this area.

Treating Multi-Diagnostic Substance Dependent Individuals with BPD Using Dialectical Behaviour Therapy

Dr. Linda Dimeff, Chief Scientific Officer, Behavioral Tech Research, Inc., Seattle, WA

Multi-disordered, addicted individuals are among the most difficult to treat. The sheer number of chronic, serious problems often defeats treatment-as-usual. **Marsha M. Linehan, Linda Dimeff, and colleagues** have adapted Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) for Substance Abusers. This approach was originally developed for chronically suicidal women with borderline personality disorder (BPD). Now adapted for substance abusers, it blends cognitive-behavioral techniques to treat serious mental health problems with specific strategies to successfully reduce substance abuse and improve treatment retention among poly-substance dependent individuals with BPD. Modifications to standard DBT include dialectical abstinence (a synthesis between absolute abstinence and harm reduction approaches), specific behavioral targets for drug use, changes in emphasis of DBT skills, and attachment strategies to reduce premature client dropout and to increase engagement with treatment.

This one-day workshop is intended for individuals who are familiar with DBT as a treatment and who want to learn the basics of applying it to their dually-diagnosed clients. The presenter will use lecture, videotapes, and practice exercises to teach the principles and strategies of DBT applied to substance dependent clients with BPD. The following topics are covered: 1) dialectical abstinence, 2) "Path to Clear Mind" behavioral targets for substance abusers with BPD, 3) adaptations of DBT skills, 4) attachment strategies to reduce premature treatment drop out and increase engagement.

2. List and describe Path to Clear Mind Targets for substance dependent individuals with BPD.
3. Describe adaptations of DBT skills for substance dependent individuals with BPD.
4. Describe attachment strategies and other DBT engagement strategies to reduce premature drop out.

ABOUT THE PRESENTER

Linda Dimeff, PhD; is Chief Scientific Officer for Behavioral Tech Research, Inc., an organization devoted to the dissemination of evidence-based practices (EBPs). She also holds an appointment as clinical faculty in the Department of Psychology at the University of Washington. Dr. Dimeff received her doctoral degree in clinical psychology from the University of Washington, where she specialized in prevention and treatment of addictive behaviors under the mentoring of G. Alan Marlatt, Ph.D., and in dialectical behavior therapy (DBT), with **Marsha M. Linehan, Ph.D.** Dr. Dimeff collaborated with Dr. Linehan in the development of an adaptation of DBT for substance dependent individuals with borderline personality disorder, and is currently co-authoring a book with Dr. Linehan that describes this treatment. She continues her work as a research therapist on Dr. Linehan's large research trials on DBT. Dr. Dimeff currently has five dissemination research grants through the National Institutes of Health. Over the years, Dr. Dimeff has written numerous theoretical and empirical papers in the areas of addictive behaviors, DBT, and dissemination, and is completing an edited collection of writings on adaptations of DBT to real world settings. Dr. Dimeff's experience includes providing clinical supervision in DBT and other EBPs, as well as extensive training, supervision, and consultation to large public sector systems in the implementation of DBT.
